Whilst the gospel of Matthew emphasises that Jesus is the Jewish king, Matthew also reveals that Jesus is the king of all people.

In his narrative of Jesus' birth, Matthew includes the homage of the wise men of the East to Jesus. They were of non-Jewish lineage, yet they came to worship the king of the Jews. They bowed down before Jesus and acknowledged His right to rule and reign.

Jesus is the link between the Old and New Testament.

Mark's portrayal of Jesus focuses on Him as the anointed Servant who came to serve humanity. Jesus preached, taught and did life with humanity. He healed, cast out demons, provided practically and ultimately sacrificed His life. All for the sake of humanity.

Jesus, the Son of God who became the Son the Man, reveals the servant heart of God.

God prepares the ground and the harvest fields for the sowing of His good seed, the gospel of Jesus Christ.

John's portrait of Jesus is God who became human. Jesus was fully human and fully divine. Before the beginning of time, He was.

Throughout the gospel according to John, one of the most frequently used titles for Jesus reflecting His divinity and relationship with God the Father is the Son of God.

Jesus is the divine light who gives eternal life to all who receive Him and accept His right to rule and reign.



In summary, each Gospel portrays a different aspect of Jesus. Matthew's portrait of the promised Jewish king (as a lion), Mark's portrait of the anointed servant (represented as an ox), Luke's portrait of the son of man (the perfect human), and John's portrait of the divine (an eagle), combine to give us a greater revelation of who God is and what He has done for us.

To gain a greater understanding of God's intended meaning we encourage you to read the whole gospel according to John, keeping the writer John's intent in mind, which was to reveal that Jesus is the Messiah, the Son of God.

These four aspects that are represented as the Lion, the Ox, the Man and the Eagle are reminiscent of two visions of heaven as recorded in God's love story, the Bible. One is the Old Testament, given to the prophet and priest Ezekiel. The other is in the New Testament, given to the Apostle John.

Let us now take a glimpse into heaven and receive a greater revelation of the significance of the lion, the ox, the man and the eagle.

Before we go to the vision of heaven of the four creatures in the Old Testament, let us first understand the context and culture at the time of writing.

Through the depiction of the lion, the ox, the man and the eagle, we not only see into heaven, but we receive a greater revelation of Jesus and the awe and wonder of God.

Understanding the symbolism of the lion, the ox, the man and the eagle brings a greater revelation of the aspects of the Son of God who became the Son of Man.

In the visions that include the lion, the ox, the man and the eagle, God's love and desire for all people to know and experience Him is revealed. It is so beautiful and incredibly special for God to reveal the characteristics of Himself in this way, as every person and every culture can connect with them.

The four creatures also help us understand the reasons for the four different gospels, and how each of the four gospels emphasise a different aspect of Jesus. The visions that include the four creatures, and portray the aspects of Jesus, also link together both the Old and New Testament.

Why was it written?

Given that the kingdom of heaven is like the landowner, through this parable we learn much about God and His character. For in this parable, the landowner represents God. The landowner constantly goes out searching for the one who is willing. Willing to enter into his vineyard and be part of the landowner's kingdom.

There are workers in the parable that the world has passed by, yet the landowner includes all who are willing into his kingdom. The landowner is just and therefore treats each one equally. Each one is given the same reward, regardless of age, ethnicity, socioeconomic status or gender.



This parable is a beautiful expression of God and His kingdom. God is constantly searching for the one who is willing. Willing to receive Jesus, receive God and His right to rule and reign and as a result, enter into their equal part in His kingdom.

God is just and therefore the invitation to enter into His kingdom is there for all. Even when the world passes us by and we have no place or purpose, God gives to each one equal status, equal purpose and an equal share of His kingdom regardless of age, ethnicity, socioeconomic status or gender.

To all who have received Jesus, received God, we all receive the same reward. That is, God Himself, His identity and the fullness of His kingdom.

Given that salvation and entry into heaven is a gift from God of Himself to us, then why did Jesus say in a parable, "Depart from Me, you cursed, into the everlasting fire prepared for the devil and his angels: for I was hungry and you gave Me no food; I was thirsty and you gave Me no drink; I was a stranger and you did not take Me in, naked and you did not clothe Me, sick and in prison and you did not visit Me."

To discover God's intended meaning of this parable we will complete a practical, asking the 'who', 'how', 'where', 'when', 'what' and 'why' questions of the text.

What are some of the things that are the same today that have been expressed in this parable?

Jesus tells this parable in response to the disciples' questions, 'Tell us, when will these things be? And what will be the sign of Your coming, and of the end of the age?' Through this parable Jesus reveals much about God and His kingdom. God's care and concern for justice, true justice, which is equality for all people as evident through the basic human needs being met.

Jesus also reveals through this parable that He, the Son of Man, the King of God's kingdom, is the one who determines everyone's eternal destination.



Those from every people group who have rejected Jesus and refused to receive His right to rule and reign, have rejected their only pathway of salvation. As a result, they will go away into eternal punishment. They are referred to by Jesus as the goats and by implication, the unrighteous.

Those from every people group that have received Jesus and accepted His right to rule and reign, receive His eternal life. As a result, they are blessed by the Father in heaven and inherit His eternal life and kingdom. They are referred to by Jesus as the sheep, my brethren, the righteous.
