
Why was it written? 📖 [16:23]

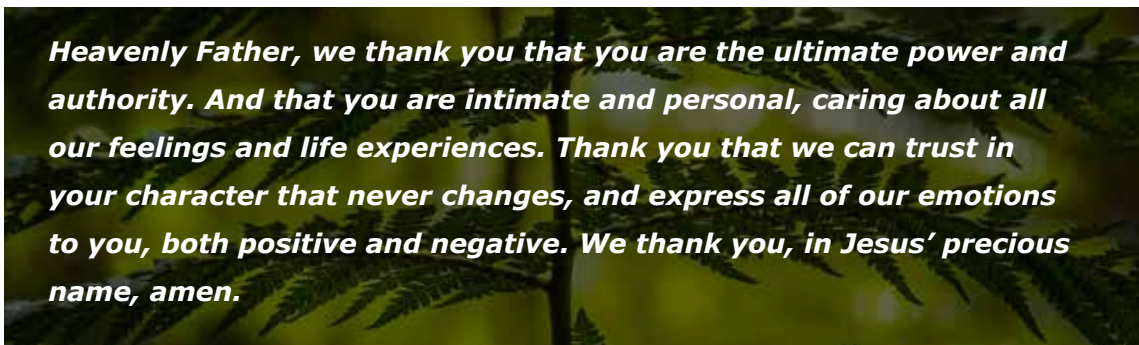

Psalm 136 is a psalm of thanksgiving, reflecting on God's character and His salvation plan for all people to know Him. By recounting God's journey with the Ancient Israelites and His judgement on the gods of Ancient Egypt, the psalmist calls the listeners to give thanks to God

Why was it written?

Psalm 49 is a psalm of wisdom. The psalmist inclines his ear to a proverb and states that he will not fear the days of evil, for those who trust in their wealth rather than in God cannot redeem themselves or another. Death comes to all of humanity and when one dies, they can carry nothing away. In contrast, the psalmist rejoices that God will redeem his soul from the power of the grave. The writer concludes that the wealth of this world and the praise of humanity is meaningless.

Psalm 78 is a psalm that recounts the salvation history of the Ancient Israelites. God's character is powerfully revealed throughout the entire psalm. Even with the stubborn and rebellious generation, God walked with them, provided for them, cared for them and continually revealed Himself to them. Being full of compassion and in an eternal state of forgiveness, many times God turned His anger away from them even though they continued to betray Him. In amongst all this, God remained faithful to His promises and continually offered them His salvation.

Why was it written?

Psalm 100 is a psalm of praise. It is a call to all peoples to give a joyful shout to the LORD, the Eternal One. The writer reveals the goodness and mercy of the LORD, concluding that His truth endures to all generations. As the LORD is our creator, the writer exhorts all people to come before His presence singing. Those who choose the LORD are His sheep in His care. In response, let His people praise Him, bless His name and be thankful to Him.

If the psalms are humanity's expression to God, why do some of the psalms include God's words?

While the psalms are humanity's expression to God, filled with raw emotion and have various themes, there are psalms that include God's direct word. In one such psalm (Psalm 46) God states, *Be still and know that I am God*. These words of God are included as part of God's relationship with the psalmist and are a reflection of God's character.

What is the context of this scripture (**Psalm 95**) in God’s whole story? Refer to timeline illustration on page 5.

Why was it written?

Psalm 95 is a psalm of celebration. It was written to encourage the Ancient Israelites to celebrate their covenant with God and to remain faithful to it. Within the celebration are the psalmist’s revelation of God’s character. Also, from verses 8-11, there are the words of God to the first hearers of the psalm. The first hearers were those who were descendants of the Ancient Israelites, who God freed from the bondage of Egypt. Also included are the words of God which He had directed to their forefathers. They had chosen to reject God and as a result, they did not enter into His rest as they denied their only pathway to salvation. Through recounting God’s words to their forefathers, the psalmist is encouraging the current generation to remain faithful to their covenant with God. That is, for God to be their God and they to be His people—the people of His pasture and the sheep of His hand.

When journeying through Psalm 95, we too can be encouraged to celebrate who God is and to remain faithful to our covenant with Him. Where He is our God and we too are the people of His pasture and the sheep of His hand.

Throughout God's love story the bible, there are other references to the words of God that have been included in Psalm 95. The writer of the book of Hebrews recounts the history of the Ancient Israelites and how they, having chosen to reject God, did not enter into His rest. The writer's intent of the book of Hebrews is the same as that of the psalmist's—to encourage the first hearers, and also us today, to remain faithful to God's covenant. A covenant of mutual agreement and a relationship of honour and respect where God is our God and we are His people. For a greater revelation of the history of the Ancient Israelites, read Hebrews chapters 3 and 4.

If the psalms are humanity's expression to God, why do some of the psalms include prophecy?

Throughout the psalms there are instances of when God foretells of what will take place. Especially in regards to His salvation plan being fulfilled in the coming of the promised Messiah. As Jesus said in Luke 24:44, the Law of Moses, the Prophets and the Psalms testify of Him.



In amongst the psalmists pouring out their hearts to God, God shares His heart and salvation plan with them. Through the inclusion of God’s prophesies, God’s salvation plan is shared with the first hearers and with us today.

Everything that God foretold about Jesus in the Old Testament must be fulfilled. In the New Testament (Luke 24:45), we discover that Jesus opened the first hearers’ understanding so they might comprehend God’s intended meaning of the scriptures and His heart for all humanity.

One such psalm that includes the foretelling of the coming Messiah is Psalm 22.

Let us do a practical to discover how to understand God’s intended meaning of the psalms that include prophecy and how Jesus’ coming fulfils them.

Why was it written?

Psalm 22 is a psalm of lament or sorrow. It is the writer's inward focus and expression of emotional pain. It is also a powerful foretelling of how God in Jesus would identify with humanity's sorrow.

Let us go to the time when Jesus was on the cross and expressed the ultimate sorrow and emotional pain of humanity. Read **Matthew 27:46**

On the cross, Jesus was quoting Psalm 22. He was identifying with humanity's suffering, subjecting Himself to the hands of humanity's brutality and oppression, pride and shame. Paying the cost, which is death, for all humanity. By the Son of God becoming human, He represented both God and humanity. In human form He revealed the heart of God and His desire to set us free from the ultimate sorrow and emotional pain.



As those who heard Jesus quoting Psalm 22 would have known the entire psalm, Jesus was also testifying of who He is and God’s right to rule and reign. Jesus was fulfilling both the prophetic words throughout Psalm 22 and its conclusion. For from the time of His death and resurrection, subsequent generations continue to testify of Him.

In conclusion, prophecies have been included in some of the psalms to reveal who God is and what He has done and will do to set humanity free. While the psalms are humanity’s expression to God, through God’s journey with the writers, He reveals Himself in various ways. In this instance, prophetic words of what will take place.
